

### CRIME TIPS Hanging Up on Cell Phone Scams

Telephone scams have been around as long as there have been telephones, and new technology has created new opportunities for thieves to try and separate you from your money. "We are starting to see a lot of submittals involving cell phones," said Michael Gingold, Chief of the MCAO's



Fraud and Identity Theft Enforcement (FITE) Bureau. "Several involve scammers approaching victims asking them to purchase a phone for them."

In one such scenario, thieves approach a victim outside a cell phone store wearing fake but official looking badges indicating they work for Verizon. "These scammers will give cash to victims and invite them to use a portion of the money to purchase a phone as part of a "mystery shopper" program," said Deputy County Attorney Gregory Cecilia, who handles such cases. The scammer lets the victim keep the extra cash, but what they don't say is that by purchasing the phone, the victim is also signing a contract with a phone service provider.

While the scammer walks away with a new cell phone, the unwitting victim gets stuck with service fees that accumulate as part of the contract they didn't realize they signed. If they try and cancel the service, they're required to pay termination fees totaling much more than what they received from the scammer.

"Before participating in any supposed 'mystery shopper' program, go to an actual retail store and confirm with a manager that such a program exists," Cecilia advises.

# The Year that Was - Imposter Scams and Frauds

Imposter scams dominated the news in 2014 and also appeared frequently in AARP's Fraud Watch Network scam tracking map. Here are a few examples.

# **IRS SCAMS**

How it works: Tax season will be soon upon us, and scammers posing as IRS officials continue to call, saying you owe taxes and better pay up. They threaten to arrest or deport people, revoke a license, or even shut down a business. How do they do it? By rigging caller ID information to appear as if the IRS is calling, and sometimes even making a follow-up call claiming to be the police or the DMV. What to do: But remember, the IRS will not call you on the phone; if they need to start a conversation with you, they will do it by official paper mail. However, if you owe — or think you owe — federal taxes, call the IRS at 800-829-1040 or go to irs.gov; IRS workers

can help you with your payment questions.

#### **Grandparents Scam**

How it works: We also heard a lot this year about the "grandparent scam." That's when you get a phone call from someone saying that your grandchild or another loved one is in trouble. The con artist exploits the love and generosity of the grandparent by pretending to be a grandchild or someone helping the grandparent by pretending to emergency funds. The fraudster convinces the grandparent that they are helping a grandchild pay for transportation home from a foreign country, for medical treatment, or bail.

What to do: Don't fall for it. Independently check on the status of your family member first; don't provide any personal information; and don't wire any money. If you have gotten a call like this contact your local Attorney General's Office (naag.org).

#### 2014: Crime Drops Cop Next Door from Phoenix Police Department

As the first month of 2015 comes to a close it's natural to reflect on the previous year's accomplishments. We have devoted a lot of time and energy on our Super Bowl events but I want to assure you that our focus is, and always will be, providing the safest community possible year round. As a police department, one of the ways we evaluate our effectiveness is through analysis of the annual crime statistics. Though it's no surprise to the very hard working men and women of the Phoenix Police Department, citizens may be unaware of just



how much crime was reduced last year. Overall, crime dropped 5.6 % in 2014 compared to 2013.

Violent Crimes are down 7.9% Homicides are down 6.5% Burglaries are down 14.5% Aggravated Assaults are down 15.1% Robberies are down 8.7%

As always, the Police Department owes much of the credit to each of you, our partners in crime fighting. We will continue our efforts in 2015 making Phoenix even safer and strengthening our relationships with our community. Our outreach through organizations like the Community Engagement Taskforce, the Citizen Police Academy, Silent Witness and Coffee with a Cop are just a few of the programs that help us understand each other and work together.
